## Red Bank Public Library

Red Bank Public Library construction will soon be underway at the Red Bank Public Library! Both the Library Board of Trustees and Borough Council, at their last meetings, passed a resolution awarding the contract to Salazar and Associates Inc. for interior ADA renovations. This will include enhancements to the main entrance, renovating the current bathrooms to be more ADA accessible, and upgrading the existing elevator to better meet increased demand and usage. Funding provided in part by the NJ State Library, the Borough of Red Bank, and fundraising efforts of the Foundation for the Red Bank Public Library will be used to complete an overall \$300,000 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) rehabilitation project.

## Finance & Personnel / Parking Committee

As summer closed, the Personnel Committee advertised the job postings for Borough Administrator and CFO. Members of the council and administration interviewed a flurry of candidates during September and October. We were lucky enough to have qualified candidates apply from all across the country. We hope to fill these critical vacancies this month.

The budgeting process is underway in accordance with the newly created Budget Calendar. The Finance committee is also planning to transition

between the acting CFO and a permanent CFO when hired. We are looking forward to having a full-time chief financial officer to help drive down the costs of the consulting accounting firm.

The Parking Committee has re-assigned 15 minute spaces and realigned parking to make it convenient for visitors and residents alike to run quick errands. Look for 15-minute spaces with street markings.

## Public Utilities Committee

Break out the champagne for our Red Bank Senior Center! After facing global supply-chain delays that pushed back the grand opening, our long-shuttered Center will finally re-open its doors for our beloved members in January 2023! Look for grand opening news to be announced Christmas week.

Forever Saved! We've begun the process to place riverfront land at the Senior Center on the Recreation Open Space Inventory (ROSI) protecting access to the riverfront and the threat of sale to private developers.

Prepping Broadwalk 2023! As "Broadwalk 2022" packed up for the winter, and Broad Street prepares for the holidays, the Broadwalk Committee will reconvene this month to start planning the 2023 season. We will be ensuring a smooth transition for the warmer months that includes input from businesses, residents and the

general public.

Time for some PickleBall? After laying empty for 10 years after Superstorm Sandy, the clay courts at Marine Park are being investigated to become pickleball courts so our residents might enjoy some waterfront fun on the Navesink River. Paradise should never be paved for a parking lot, so we have begun conversations with the engineers and DEP/Green Acres.

After a three-decade delay, it's time for Red Bank to hire the architect to work with our engineers to find a permanent home for our DPW department. Committee discussions have begun and we will report on progression.

East Side sewer infrastructure at High Street needs major upgrades to ensure proper flow. Early-stage discussions for engineering and design have begun. - *Councilman Edward Zipprich*

## Code Enforcement, Environmental Control, Health, Welfare & Building Codes

On Thursday, October 20<sup>th</sup> the Red Bank Housing Authority will be hosting a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) representative to tour Evergreen and Montgomery Terrace and speak with the Housing Authority Leadership team. As Council Liaison for the Housing Authority, I was also invited for this opportunity to explore ways in which the Borough can partner with HUD and the Housing Authority to make the much needed and long overdue upgrades to Red Bank's low-income housing stock. I have always believed there are opportunities to increase the Borough's senior, low-income and affordable housing inventory utilizing the properties already owned and managed by the Red Bank Housing Authority. This is the perfect situation to pursue this goal.

I have been in discussions with the Borough's Fair Share Housing Attor-

ney on alternative uses for money originally set aside for first-time home buyers in Red Bank. The first-time home-buyers program was part of the Borough's original Fair-Share Housing settlement agreement and would provide up to \$10,000 to qualified (low-income) applicants looking to purchase a home in Red Bank. However, the program has not received any applications. As an alternative use of the money to help low-income Red Bank families, discussions have centered around converting the first-time home-buyer program into a Rental Assistance program that could help qualified applicants obtain funds for security deposits or to catch-up on delinquent rent through no fault of their own. This change in settlement terms would require the Court's approval before implementation could occur.

## VETERANS DAY

Veterans Day gives Americans the opportunity to celebrate the bravery and sacrifice of all U.S. veterans. However, most Americans confuse this holiday with Memorial Day, according to the Dept. of Veterans Affairs.

What's more, some Americans don't know why we commemorate our veterans on Nov. 11. It's imperative that all Americans know the history of Veterans Day so that we can honor our former service members properly.

Veterans Day, formerly known as Armistice Day, was originally set as a U.S. legal holiday to honor the end of World War I, which officially took place on Nov. 11, 1918. In legislation that was passed in 1938, Nov. 11 was "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day.'" As such, this new legal holiday honored World War I veterans.

In 1954, after having been through both World War II and the Korean War, the 83rd Congress - at the urging of veterans service organizations - amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans". With the approval of this legislation on June 1, 1954, Nov. 11 became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

### Parker Family Health Center

is a free medical care facility located at 211 Shrewsbury Ave, Red Bank. The clinic is named after Drs. James Parker, Jr. and Sr, two physicians who served the Red Bank community starting back in 1918. Dr. James Parker, Jr. was the first black physician granted privileges at local hospitals.

With the help of 130 medical and non medical volunteers, Parker cares for uninsured and underinsured Monmouth County residents ages 3 and up who have annual incomes less than or equal to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level. Parker provides primary care as well as services for over 16 specialties. Additionally, the clinic offers free bloodwork, eyeglasses, and financial assistance with some prescription medications.

New patients need to complete an intake appointment before their first medical appointment. Please contact the clinic at 732-212-0777 for additional information.


